Dear Parents and Carers

Thank you to Rheese Bull for his leadership at the Year One Indigenous Cultural Continuum last Wednesday. Young students from peninsula schools enjoyed listening to Rheese and examining the fabulous cultural resources supplied by him before enjoying recess together then returning to their own school.

School banking commenced today and will continue every Tuesday. Saving is a great habit to get into and school banking is an ideal way to encourage children to do so, even though the banking royal commission was not kind to the big banks!

Swimming carnival ribbons were awarded last week and again, I congratulate the children who swam so well on the day. Later this year we hope to be offering an intensive swimming scheme to students in Years Two or Three. I encourage parents to take this opportunity as while we had some terrific swimmers at the swimming carnival, the vast majority of our students are not able to swim 50 metres, unaided.

Early in Term Two, students in Years Three and Five will sit the national literacy and numeracy tests, otherwise known as NAPLAN. We will organise an information session for you, where we will answer questions and have old tests available for your perusal. This year our students will complete the assessments in booklets with a pencil but next year, the tests will be completed online. Whilst children cannot study for these tests, they are assessed on basic skills such as adding, subtracting, multiplying and dividing in the Mathematics tests and spelling, grammar and reading in the Literacy tests. Children in Year Three should have a sound knowledge of the 'Friends of Ten' and I cannot stress enough how important it is for students in Year Five to know their times tables. In Literacy, all students are encouraged to learn their spelling words for homework and read every night to increase comprehension skills, widen general knowledge and develop ideas for written tasks.

Library borrowing is now in full swing and Library bags can be purchased from Mrs Cross or Mrs Creese for \$5.00 each. Please encourage your child to borrow and read books from our library, regularly.

A number of Sydney Swans players visited our school last week. The children thoroughly enjoyed listening to their inspirational messages and watching them kick and punt AFL balls around. Good luck to the Swans this season.

Bark Reading Program

Bark is a free eight-week program to assist reluctant readers. Children practice reading aloud on a one-to-one basis to a trained therapy dog from the Delta Society. Dogs are great listeners! When reading to a dog, children enjoy an environment of unconditional acceptance and emotional support. Our animal assisted reading program removes stress and peer pressure for the reluctant reader. Bark makes reading fun.

How does Bark encourage reluctant readers to read?

A bond is encouraged between child and dog by having the same child read to the same dog each week. The dog allows children to gain confidence and self-esteem by providing his/her love and attention in an atmosphere free of criticism.

What type of students will benefit from Bark?

The Bark program is beneficial to all children struggling with their reading. This confidence building program also benefits children who lack self esteem or who are shy. Any primary aged children experiencing difficulty in reading may be nominated for the program by a teacher or parent.

How does it work?

Bark offers an eight week program during school terms. Each session is fifteen minutes. Families must commit to the full eight week program. For more information please contact our Children's Library Team on 4304 7013.

Parking Restrictions Outside Schools

KIDS LOOK TO US TO KEEP THEM SAFE - PLEASE PARK LEGALLY IN SCHOOL ZONES

Central Coast Council would like to remind parents and carers of parking restrictions outside schools. Please pay close attention to the signs outside your child's school and be aware of speed when travelling through school zones.

NO STOPPING ZONE

Stopping is NOT permitted at any time.

BUS ZONE

Stopping is not permitted during the times shown on the sign.

DOUBLE PARKING

PARKING

SCHOOL DAYS

You are not permitted to stop OR park alongside another vehicle already parked parallel to the kerb. This means not forming a gueue in the middle of the traffic lane if you are waiting. NO

NO PARKING ZONE

Drivers may drop off and pick up children during the times shown on the sign BUT note:

- Maximum stopping time is 2 MINUTES your child must exit and enter the car within this time.
- Driver must remain within 3 METRES of the vehicle you may get out to assist with bags etc.
- Stop as close as possible to the top of the zone to allow access for vehicles following behind. Parking illegally can create serious risks as it may limit the vision of other drivers.

SAFETY DOOR

The Safety Door is the rear door, closest to the kerb, footpath or gutter and away from the road. Always let your children out of the vehicle on the FOOTPATH SIDE OF THE ROAD.

Please consider the school's neighbours by leaving space at their driveways to allow safe exit and entry to the roadway.

Road Rules 2014 269 Opening doors and getting out of a vehicle etc

(3) A person must not cause a hazard to any person or vehicle by opening a door of a vehicle, leaving a door of a vehicle open, or getting off, or out of, a vehicle.

This offence attracts a level 5 penalty notice, which is currently set at \$337.

Stopping ON or ACROSS a driveway or other access point to and from a property is not permitted under any circumstances.

Travelling more than 40 km/hour through school zones may inhibit a car from stopping in time to avoid hitting a pedestrian.

It only takes a split second for a crash to occur and only one car to present a danger to an unknowing child.

Please be aware of the restrictions and park safely outside your child's school.
